The 24 children who have been chosen for the national bravery awards this year – five of them posthumously – stood up to challenges without any concern for their personal safety, in a way that not many adults would. They have done incredible feats like fighting off robbers, saving children from drowning, and rescuing students trapped in vans. The kind of spirit and courage that these young brave hearts showed in the face of adversity is truly remarkable.

Mittal Patadiya, the 12-year-old girl who won the prestigious Geeta Chopra Award, has 350 stitches on her neck and cheek as a proof of her valour in combating robbers who had entered her home in Gujarat's Naroda. The burn injuries Om Prakash Yadav bore while saving his friends from a burning van have not in the least dampened his spirit. Kapil, a 15-year-old, paid the ultimate price for trying to help his classmates cross a bridge across a brook.

Besides recognizing courage as a supreme human virtue and encouraging children to imbibe such a spirit, the bravery awards are reminders to all citizens of their duty towards society in general. The indifference that you get to see on the streets on a regular basis, with victims of accident or attack lying unattended, is indeed very disturbing. If children can be brave enough to endanger their lives for the sake of others, why do adults hesitate to do the same?
